## History: LEARNING JOURNEY



Focusing on the development of the Nazi Party at this point in the year enables the revisiting of Paper 3 content covered in Year 11 Autumn 1 and 2. Both strands of the narrative are then brought together from 1929 to understand how the failures of the Weimar Republic linked to the rise of the Nazi Party. The GCSE content is completed by studying aspects of life in Nazi Germany, thus deepening knowledge and understanding acquired in Year 9. Lessons during this part of Year 11 will be divided between learning about life in Nazi Germany and revising knowledge and understanding from earlier [parts of the GCSE course].

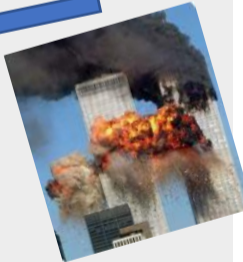


We will look at the international structures set up to try to protect people after WW2 and investigate a case study on the United Nations attempts to prevent genocide after World War Two. We will recap your learning on the Holocaust to support the judgements you make on the Rwandan case study.

Year 10

America and the Cold War

We will complete Year 9 by asking how has Uttroxteter changed during the century that we have been learning about this year.



We will investigate key aspects of American and Cold War history to enable us to make links between these events and more recent events such as 9/11 which are shaping the 21st century world.

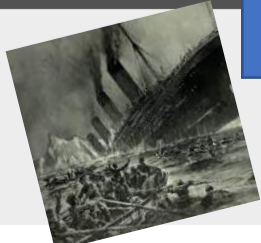
Year 9

Y8 Taster Sessions / Transition days

The short-term and long-term consequences of World War One will be studied. We will examine how they link to the rise of Hitler in Germany. This content will also support Year 11 Paper 3 history which looks in more depth at German history 1918 - 1939.



We will examine the long-term and short-term causes of World War One to develop our understanding of cause and consequence. We will then investigate World War One in time to reflect on our understanding of this event by November 11th. This content will support understanding of Paper 1 at GCSE History



Year 9 builds on learning undertaken in the Middle Schools by extending chronological knowledge and understanding of British and world history with a focus on the 20th century.
