
The God of Classical Theism is scrutinised as



Philosophy: Cosmological Argument **Ethics: Equality and Sexual Ethics**

This argument introduces the key Christian thinker



A diverse exploration of applied ethics in relation to sexual ethics. This includes the continuing relevance of sexual ethics on changing social attitudes on issues of sex inside and out of marriage, adultery, promiscuity, same-sex relationships, contraception and childlessness.



Application of Ethics theories - War and Peace. This includes a focus on the Just War Theory, nuclear war, pacifism and the technological advancement of war and an evaluation of w hether wars can ever reach their goal.

A Study of the Design argument, this is the first of 3 areas of study in relation to arguments for the existence of God. cases. Each theory is evaluated to establish its

Students will question the belief that the universe ha structure, order and purpose and consider if this can be seen as proof of God.
